Foundation, CoBank support Hometown Veterans group

Service to our country through military duty oftentimes requires the soldier to put aside personal and family concerns for the good of his and her fellow soldiers.

When these military veterans return home or make a new home, there are inherent challenges with picking up the mantel of civilian life. Some are physical, while others are financial, emotional, or social. There are many outreach and assistance programs available to veterans no matter how long it has been since they wore the uniform in defense of our country.

Since 2010, the Hometown Veterans organization from Gillette has been offering informational breakfasts and community outreach programs. Gillette Mayor Duane Evenson commissioned the idea in 2009 on the aforementioned ideals.

This group is a partnership between leaders of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion, with the intent of bringing veterans of all eras together once a month to discuss issues of common interest.

It started out as a monthly morning breakfast and that remains the central point of the group. These breakfasts entail good food at the Campbell

County Senior Center, but also food for thought regarding a range of issues related to veterans programs.

"It is also a time to solidify friendships, communicate, help each other, and hear about issues of importance to our veterans," said organizer Paul Woessner. Support for the breakfast program has been overwhelming and the costs of that event are now covered through a perpetual grant.

However, the veterans group has also ventured out into the community with school programs and education events working with area youth. The programs include patriotic celebrations, sessions on flag etiquette and history, and discussions on the Constitution and freedom.

These activities are volunteer-driven, but there are ancillary costs associated with them including the purchase of educational materials and handouts.

In 2014, the Powder River Energy Foundation learned of the good things the Hometown Veterans group was doing and offered to help. During the 2014 Foundation Golf Tournament, \$5,000 was raised to help defray

some of the costs associated with the community outreach efforts. CoBank, a financial institution that lends to electric cooperatives including Powder River Energy, matched that \$5,000 through its "Sharing Success" charitable giving program.

With the two significant donations, Hometown Veterans and the PRECorp Foundation will work together to bring more awareness of veterans issues to the members of Powder River Energy across northeast Wyoming.
